Theatre Arts – Theatre Script Library Permission

It is a requirement of all theatre arts classes to read scripts of plays to research scenes, create designs, and prepare monologues and scene work. Theatre is establishing an extensive library of scripts. These scripts range from classic period pieces to current Broadway productions. Most are recognized for their literary merit and have been selected are deemed MS appropriate. Scripts include Pulitzer Prize winners, Tony award nominees and winners, as well as scripts that have been freely adapted across the state for the UIL One Act Play Competition. These scripts have not been edited or censored in content for reading purposes. Some of the scripts contain adult language or mature themes. This is not exclusive to modern material. Although the language is more archaic, Greek, Roman, Elizabethan, as well as the Biblical Medieval Pageant Plays dealt with mature and sometime controversial concepts. For public performance purposes, scripts will be edited to conform to FISD Policy.

Students or Parents/Guardians of students who do not wish for their student to read the assigned scripts need to indicate as such below, and every effort will be made to provide the student with appropriate literature without penalty. If a script is checked out by a student, it becomes the responsibility of the student. Students are responsible for returning the scripts intact and unmarked. Should a student not return the original script, that student is responsible for replacing the script.Please fill out and return this form with the rest of the Theatre beginning year forms.
